HEAD ROAD CAPTAIN

Greetings all HOG members.

I hope everyone has had a spectacular summer of riding. The

month of August ended and September has started with an absolutely amazing stretch of fantastic riding weather. Cool mornings, warm afternoons and later on, cool evenings. It doesn't get much better than this.

You may have already noticed the days getting shorter and sadly, it's just not your imagination. As much as I don't wish to admit it, they are.

With that in mind, I'd like to throw out a few thoughts about riding into the evenings of things I've learned over the years. Obviously, you have to adjust a lot of your techniques for dusk and night riding but here a couple ideas you may wish to keep in mind.

In one of my early newsletter contributions, I mentioned that the guy (car) in front of you, while important to pay attention to, I think it's the vehicle in front of *him* to put a little more effort into keeping track of. Here's how. Mostly, we sit a little higher and can look through the car's front and rear windows and keep a look out for changes. If we can see that guys brake lights for example, a few seconds sooner instead of waiting for the car in front of you to react, that's all the better for us.

Secondly, as it's getting darker and say now, the vehicle in front of you is an SUV, you can't employ the 'ole "look-through-the-other-guys-windows" trick. Interestingly enough, pavement is a bit reflective. You can still pay attention to upcoming braking situations by looking for the reflections of the car, truck, whatever in front of the SUV be watching the road *under* the SUV.

For oncoming traffic, in a hilly or curvy situation, look for the approaching headlights reflections on the telephone and power lines along the road.

The overall point is, the sooner you can be prepared for traffic, the better.

Lastly, remember to keep us in mind if we can help out with a ride; planning or leading or for ideas.

SAFETY OFFICER

Some of the best riding of the season is upon us; lets' enjoy it!


As the Sun lowers its self in the sky, it's

evident the season is changing, cool morning and warm COLORFUL riding days will soon be upon us. You may also find the sun in your eyes more often as well. Here's an advance-level riding tip that I'd like to share. This was developed to block the sun at those unique times of day where the blinding sun often finds its way into your vision. To start, choose the style of helmet (available at PHD) with a retractable clear face-shield that's an integral part of the helmet and has the ability to position the clear face-shield at almost any vertical angle. Adhering a one inch wide piece of black vinyl on the very bottom edge of the clear face-shield, creates a narrow sun-block band that could quickly be positioned to block the blinding sun with a simply vertical flick of the face shield, either up or down as necessary. When the clear face shield is positioned fully up or fully down, the black vinyl is virtually out of sight. A \$2 'pool liner locking clip' available at almost any pool store, makes an excellent sun-block band.


Blind Intersections

If you approach a blind intersection, move to the portion of the lane that will bring you into another driver's field of vision at the earliest possible moment. In this picture, the rider has moved to the left portion of the lane — away from the parked car — so the driver on the cross street can see him as soon as possible.




Remember, the key is to see as much as possible and remain visible to others while protecting your space.



If you have a stop sign or stop line, stop there first. Then edge forward and stop again, just short of where the crosstraffic lane meets your lane. From that position, lean your body forward and look around buildings, parked cars, or bushes to see if anything is coming. Just make sure your front wheel stays out of the cross lane of travel while you're looking.

Passing Parked Cars



When passing parked cars, stay toward the left of your lane. You can avoid problems caused by doors opening, drivers getting out of cars, or people stepping from between cars. If oncoming traffic is present, it is usually best to remain in the center-lane position to maximize your space cushion.

A bigger problem can occur if the driver pulls away from the curb without checking for traffic behind. Even if he does look, he may fail to see you. In either event, the driver might cut into your path. Slow down or change lanes to make room for someone cutting in. Cars making a sudden U-turn are the most dangerous. They may cut you off entirely, blocking the whole roadway and leaving you with no place to go. Since you cannot tell what a driver will do, slow down and get the driver's attention. Sound your horn and continue with caution.


